SOCI 4903 Culture & Society Tuesdays & Thursdays, 11:20 – 12:45 PM

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COURSE DESCRIPTION

"Culture" is a ubiquitous term often used as shorthand to describe a host of social phenomena, from the behaviors and customs of groups, to the production of material objects, to sets of ideas in the public sphere. Because of its rather ordinariness, we often take the interaction between society and culture for granted. That is, how does our society—what might be thought of as our social structure—shape the multiple uses and manifestations of culture we experience? And in tandem, how does culture affect the social structure? This course will consider these two questions, encapsulated in now classic debates between social theorists Karl Marx and Max Weber, through examinations of shared sets of beliefs and ideas, the products of culture, and the rituals and customs of groups. Importantly, it will empirically examine which social phenomena the concept of culture *can* and *cannot* explain.

GENERAL COURSE EXPECTATIONS

I expect you to come to class, to come to class on time, to come to class prepared, and to be attentive and engaged throughout class. I realize that you have classes beyond this class and lives beyond the University, but I expect that you will have done the necessary work before class, including the readings and other assignments as due, with care, effort, and diligence. I expect that you will have eaten before class and that you will not bring a value meal of any sort to class. I expect that you will turn assignments in on time, as late assignments are only accepted in the event of the Zombie Apocalypse, and then only in the event that you survive. If I am taken in the Zombie Apocalypse, note that your assignment is still due.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Discussion Questions. Each Tuesday by 8 AM, you will submit at least three discussion questions based on the readings for that week. These questions should be critical questions that are sparked by the reading and should go beyond surface knowledge that can be gleaned from the texts. Questions will be graded on their level of critical engagement with the readings.

Discussion questions are worth 10% of the final grade.

Culture Buzz. In response to the Culture Buzz topic, lecture and discussion, current events in the media, and/or course texts, write a brief, **750-word essay** that critically examines some aspect of the Culture Buzz topic. This essay should not rehash the main points of the Culture Buzz topic, but instead should use it as a starting point to critically reflect on a particular related issue. Culture Buzz essays are due the Tuesday after the completion of each course section. You should complete three (3) Culture Buzz essays. Each Culture Buzz essay is worth 15% of your final grade for a total of 45%.

Midterm Examination. The midterm examination will cover all of the course material for the first half of the course, and will evaluate your ability to explicate theoretical concepts vis-à-vis course themes. The examination will occur in class on October 9, 2014 and will require a blue book. **The midterm exam is worth 20% of the final grade.**

Final Examination. The final examination is comprehensive, although it will focus on course materials covered in the second half of the course, and will evaluate your ability to apply theoretical concepts to a range of course themes. The examination will occur in class during our scheduled exam time on December 11, 2014 and will require a blue book. The final exam is worth 25% of the final grade.

COURSE CALENDAR

However, I suggest you read ahead as much as possible to glean maximum benefit from the course discussion. The "Major Text" is the text that will be central to our discussions in a particular section of the course, and I strongly suggest bringing the text to class and reading as much of it as possible BEFORE each section of the course.
