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COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course uses an interdisciplinary and intersectional lens to travel through time, sound, space, and embodiment to examine what the South has to say—demographically, economically, and culturally—through southern hip-hop. It contextualizes southern hip-hop within the larger genre of hip-hop as well as within scholarly hip-hop studies, highlighting how southern hip-hop both reflects larger cultural, social, and economic trends in the South as well as how it influences these trends.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

Personal Essay. Hip hop narrates not only the individual lives of rappers, but also the broader milieu in which they/we live and come of age. As student once wrote that her southern identity is captured by the words, "Cash Money takin' over for the 9-9 and the 2000s." Write a **three-page** critical personal personal history in and through your relationship to hip-hop, and southern hip-hop in particular if applicable. What were the sights, sounds, and moments that defined your coming of age, and how does coming of age alongside this art shape who you are and how you think about the world? You will also revisit and re-write this essay at the end of the semester. **The personal essay is due January 29th and March 31st. It is worth 20% of the final grade**.

Album Review Essay. Choose any southern hip-hop album ever and write a **three-page** critical review that takes into consideration course concepts and the context in which the album was created and released. What is the album's relevance to and intervention in southern hip-hop and in hip-hop more generally? How does it use sight and sound to create the South? The album review essay is due February 10th. It is worth 15% of the final grade.

Book + Film Review Essay. Choose a book and film from the list in the appendix of the syllabus, read the two together, and write a three-page critical review. You will relate these texts to course concepts and evaluate their contribution to our understanding of the post-soul South, southern hip hop, and black American experiences. The book + film review essay is due March 5th. It is worth 15% of the final grade.

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Assignment 3000. In response to current Dirty South news events, course discussions, and/or course texts, create a project—a 20-photo photo essay, a 750-word blog post that incorporates multiple media, or a seven-minute documentary video project—that critically examines some aspect of the intersections of southern hip hop, southern spaces, regional identity, and/or race, class, gender, and sexuality. See New South Negress, Red Clay Scholar, Southern Spaces, New Black Man, Pop South, and Furious and Brave for inspiration. Assignment 3000 is due April 21st. A one-page proposal is due February 26th. Assignment 3000 is worth 25% of the final grade.

Final Examination. The final examination is a comprehensive assessment of your understanding of course concepts that will ask you to critically apply your knowledge in several short answer and essay questions. The final examination is May 7th at 10:30 AM. It is worth 25% of the final grade.
